



TIP OF THE MONTH

There are many tools in an artist's tool box. Things that are needed frequently and things that are needed once in a while. In colored pencil, this tool is needed once in a while, but is very important. It is a little piece of paper about 1" x 2" with a hole punched in one end. Layers of color are applied to a colored pencil piece to achieve a realistic image. To determine if enough layers of colors are achieved, the artist places the piece of paper with the hole over a spot on the original, with the second piece of paper with the hole over a spot on the piece being created. If the color tone and density are equal, that is good. If not, it is easy to see that more layering is needed. This method is particularly important when doing portraits to achieve the correct skin tone. A small detail, but amazingly effective. We call this tool a value viewer.

Capitol Woodcarvers has teamed with the Oregon Department of Veteran Affairs and Project ABLE to conduct a "Beginner's Woodcarving Class". This class will take place July 23, 2021. We are looking forward to this event and hope that it develops into an ongoing project for us. Several Club members volunteered to teach this class.

About this event

Many Veterans continue to be mission-oriented after their military service. Woodcarving can create a sense of accomplishment like completing a mission. Woodcarving 101 is an introduction to woodworking focusing on skills needed to complete a small project and promoting a sense of accomplishment conducive to recovery.



Participants will learn about different tools and techniques, and how to practice wood carving safely. Participants will learn how wood carving can be very therapeutic and how the act of using your hands to create something of great detail can generate an anxiety-free mood. Capitol Woodcarvers will provide all the tools needed.

This will be a fun class at the completion of which each student will have a completed, or almost completed, hand-carved "Comfort Bird". We are looking forward to this and future classes.

KAA MEMBER SHARES ABOUT CREATING ART

My Ideas/Creations can be either an Epiphany or an Evolution.


EPIPHANY:

Sometimes I get an Inspiration out of the blue from a word, a song lyric, a line in a poem, a photo, a child, a dream, a walk through a gallery or antique shop. I keep little journals at home so I can write those down. Usually when I set about to create from these inspired bits, I have to do it quickly while the idea is fresh. And those pieces just create themselves. They are very fluid, they tell me what they want to be. These pieces are almost always Paintings or Colored Pencil work.

EVOLUTION:

Sometimes I'm not quite sure WHAT I'm wanting to create. So that's when I go with my Mapwork or Collage. Because those allow me to think, re-think, play with parts of the whole, arranging and re-arranging. The piece grows and changes constantly until I am happy with the colors and the bits and pieces, happy with the symmetry or asymmetry of it all. But, again, they tell me what they want to be. They just "become" more slowly. They evolve/emerge over time. These are pieces I can set aside and come back to without losing interest.

OH! Also, listening to music while I create is pretty much a must. Rock and Roll!

The Oregon Arts Commission, in partnership with the Ford Family Foundation, has created a new artist registry so artists can access funding opportunities.

Professional artists from across Oregon are encouraged to <u>sign up for the</u> <u>registry</u> by completing a brief survey about themselves and their artistic practice.

Eleanor Sandys, the Arts Commission's interim visual arts coordinator, said there are many working artists throughout Oregon who aren't in their database.

"Our hope is to update and expand our artist network so that we can better support the diverse artists in Oregon's many communities," she said in a prepared statement.

While the registry will remain open, artists are strongly encouraged to sign up by September 30th to establish a base registry.
