JUNE, 2021, "ANNUAL PHOTOGRAPHY VIRTUAL SHOW"


June is the KAA "Annual Photography" Show. This show always contains many beautiful photos of the world around us. Entries in this show will be the artist's choice of subject.

First Place: "Wild Roses", Nola Pear

Gorgeous painting. True command of a difficult medium. Softness. Depth. Soothing palette. Subtle variation edges and of colors and neutrals to balance the pure blues and golds. The third wild rose in the background is a ghost of a flower and when you notice it you feel like you made a discovery of a secret within the painting. High contrast in centers of flowers pull the eye in. Captures the essence of the wild roses.

PHOTOGRAPHY



First Place: "Waiting for Van Gogh", Suzie Torre-Cross

Good title and the image does call up the Impressionist master. There is almost a stained-glass quality to the photo because the flowers are rimmed in dark purple. There is also a flattening of subject matter that creates a pattern which abstracts from the actual subject. You walk into it at the far bottom right and enter a maze of bouncy bold and pleasing shapes and get lost in it. I also began to see other images as if the image was playing tricks on me...wait is that a bird? Highly engaging. Not an ordinary photo or predictable. High marks for artistry.

First Place: "Gladiola", Janice Christman

Beautifully rendered. Pleasing color palette. All the attributes of an exceptional painting. Most exciting to me are the exaggerated textures of the tall cones.

First Place: "Blossom", Laylee Julander, age 11

Beautiful photograph. Excellent display of lights and darks (highlights and shadows) and nice variety of shapes as we move around the picture. The soft colors go together so well. The clean crisp edges in the foreground pull the eye in.

Art within art. A story within a story. This painting is highly engaging and masterfully executed. It immediately invites the viewer into the painting and gets you asking questions about what is happening here. Shows tremendous accomplishment with a painstaking medium and gets everything right. KAA MEMBER SHARES ABOUT CREATING ART "Buddha Napping" by Gary Olsen-Hasek



Part of being a visual artist for me is allowing for times of discovery and visual exploration. My photo, Buddha Napping, was taken during one of our many trips to Victoria, British Columbia. We like to search out places, especially gardens, parks and art displays. One of those places is Beacon Hill Park. There are specialty gardens and plantings in addition to sculptures, water features and walking paths. It was while wandering, that I came upon this statue. It is entitled, The Moss Lady, inspired by a similar creation in England. It is a relatively recent addition to this beautiful spot which was created by park staff in 2015. We had not seen it during previous annual trips to Beacon Hill. To me, it looked like a sleeping Buddha statue that I had seen elsewhere in exhibits of Asian art. I had been taking photos as we explored. I took two of this and chose one to enter in a KAA show. I liked how the foliage had grown on and around it. Not prone toward technical precision, I tend to be an intuitive photographer and take an educated guess with my point and shoot camera. Sometime my guess works out well. It was originally a color photo, but I found that it looked better in black and white. I cropped just a sliver of the image off of it and submitted it for the Winter Showcase exhibit.

KAA TIP OF THE MONTH

Tip for watermedia artists...

Nothing is more frustrating than going to use a tube of paint and the lid is stuck. There are several ways to deal with this. One way is to soak a watercolor, guauche or casein tube in water. That usually works fine. Acrylic is a different matter. Acrylic, once it's dried, turns to plastic so it's a little more difficult. Try soaking the cap end of the tube in alcohol. If that doesn't work, cut the opposite end of the tube off. Squeeze out what you need from the cut off opposite end of the cap end then fold the cut end of the tube and secure it with a bulldog clip. Prevent caps from sticking by dipping the cap in water before screwing it back on.

Beginner Free Verse Poetry Virtual Workshop

Shagufta Mulla, Instructor Saturdays May 29 – June 19,1 – 3 pm \$20/class = \$80

Description: Do you want to try poetry writing but don't know where to start? Explore your thoughts on nature, your inner child, or other parts of life that are meaningful to you in response to various writing prompts. You'll have an opportunity to share what you wrote (if you want) and listen to other people's poems in a supportive, positive feedback environment.

The first week I will review some basic poetry writing topics such as line breaks, imagery, alliteration, and assonance. No experience required.

Outline:

Week 1:

Review workshop format. Answer any questions.

Review some basic elements of poetry (not an exhaustive study) to help the beginner have some basics to work with.

Read a published poem and brief group discussion about it.

Write to 2 prompts and respond to one another's work.

Week 2 to 4:

Read a published poem and brief group discussion about it. Write to 2 to 3 prompts and respond to one another's work.


KAA has created an instructional environment that will meet all your online teaching needs.
